

THE result of the primary election in San Francisco gives assurance that Gage cannot be renominated for Governor. Analysis of the delegations chosen shows that he will not have more than eighty city delegates. Flint, Pardee, Edson and McNutt will get the remaining votes. The Republican Primary League wins the Forty-second and Forty-fifth districts outright and may win in the Thirty-fifth and Forty-fourth on the official count. The allied bosses put up a tremendous fight to defeat A. Ruef, the recognized leader of the Republican Primary League, but the stalwart Republicans fought the push with a vigor never surpassed in politics. Ruef and his associates will carry the banner of the league to the Republican State Convention, as they have won in the Forty-fifth one of the greatest victories in the political annals of California. The success of Ruef is a bitter disappointment to the manipulators of the Gage machine. They would have sacrificed any two districts to have compassed his defeat.

COMPLETE VICTORY IS NOW ASSURED

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HE primary election in this city yesterday resulted in defeat of the Gage forces. Careful analysis of the delegations chosen to represent the Republicans of San Francisco in the State convention at Sacramento shows that ninety-seven of the delegates are for Gage's renomination. These opposing delegations represent the following of Thomas Flint, Dr. McNutt, E. B. Edson and Dr. George C. Pardee. The Flint strength is considerable, embracing seven delegates elected in the Thirty-seventh District, five in the Thirty-eighth, four in the Forty-second and from two to five in the majority of the remaining districts. It transpires that the managers of Flint's campaign in the city performed effective work on the quiet. Representation was secured on every ticket put in the field.

The machine manipulators spent money with a lavish hand to hold the line. All the purchasable elements of the Democratic party were bought outright with coin handed to bosses to corrupt voters. The old, decrepit saloons and the Almshouse were debauched with liquor and given \$1 apiece to vote the Gage ticket. The official count will probably diminish rather than increase the strength of allied bosses in San Francisco.

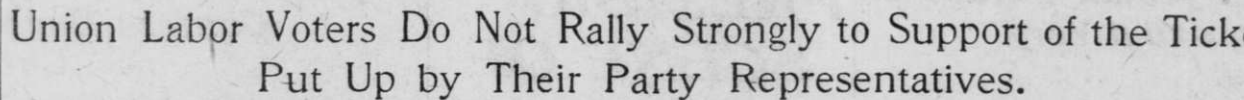
